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## INTRODUCTION

FIDM/Fashion Institute of Design & Merchandising is dedicated to providing a safe working and learning environment. This report states current campus policies regarding procedures for students and others to report criminal

actions or other emergencies occurring on the campus. While Campus Security plays a role in ensuring that our campuses remain as safe as possible, the responsibility for crime prevention and personal safety rests with each individual. Therefore, each of us must take personal responsibility for our own safety, as well as for the safety of those around us. FIDM also strives to provide timely warning to the campus community about crimes that pose an ongoing threat to students and employees as well as providing 24-hour security. Working together, we will continue to make FIDM one of the safest urban colleges in the country. Please review the information available in this booklet to become familiar with the programs and services provided by the college so you may become involved as a responsible member of our community.

## **PREPARING ANNUAL DISCLOSURE OF CRIME STATISTICS**

To ensure the safety and well-being of our campus community and in compliance with the *Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act (1990)* (20 USC Section 1092(f)) (*Clery Act*), FIDM publishes and distributes the Annual Security Report disclosing campus security policies and three years' worth of specified *Clery Act* crimes and arrest statistics. FIDM also schedules crime prevention and campus safety seminars on all campuses, in addition to quarterly seminars on substance abuse prevention. Campus crime reports and surveys are made readily available to the general public on our website [www.fidm.edu](http://www.fidm.edu). The reports include statistical information about criminal offenses, hate offenses, disciplinary actions/judicial referrals, and arrests—whether reported by local and state police or occurring on-campus, at non-campus buildings, or on public property. The preparation of the Annual Security Report is an ongoing process. The Title IX Coordinator collaborates with the Campus Security Directors and local law enforcement to collect and categorize crime reports as well as verifying current policies for Federal compliance with the Department of Education, as amended by Section 304 of the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act of 2014, to include in the Annual Security Report for each campus. After collecting crime statistics from all sources, the Title IX Coordinator reconciles them to ensure no incident has been double counted and that the report is accurate. Upon completion of the Annual Security Report, the crime statistics are submitted to the Department of Education Campus Crime and Security website and can be viewed by the public at [www.surveys.ope.ed.gov/security](http://www.surveys.ope.ed.gov/security). FIDM will provide a paper copy of campus crime report information upon request. Each year, an email notification is sent to all enrolled students, current staff, and faculty who provide web addresses, to access the full report. The statistics that are accumulated and reported are in reference to the geographical areas including: (i) Buildings and property that are part of FIDM's campuses; (ii) FIDM's non-campus buildings and property (defined as any building or property owned or controlled by a student organization that is officially recognized by the FIDM or that is used in direct support of, or in relation to, FIDM's educational purposes, is frequently used by FIDM students, and is not within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the FIDM campus); and (iii) Public property within or immediately adjacent to and accessible from FIDM campuses.

## **ACCURATE AND PROMPT CRIME REPORTING PROCEDURES**

Community members, students, faculty, staff, and guests are encouraged to report all crimes and public safety related incidents in an accurate and prompt manner. Whether it happens to you or you are a witness, you have a responsibility to call Campus Security or the local Police Department to report a crime.

*"In the First Two Minutes..."* When police arrive at the scene of a crime-in-progress within two minutes of receiving the call, the chances of apprehending a suspect are greatly increased. The odds of making an arrest decrease quickly as the minutes tick by. Timely reporting a crime is important and can help prevent them from happening again. Immediately go to a safe place and call. Stay on the line and tell the dispatcher everything you can remember about the suspect (his/her clothing, vehicle, and direction of travel).

## **CAMPUS SECURITY AUTHORITY**

For the purposes of this report, a Campus Security Authority is defined as:

- (1) A campus police department or a campus security department of an institution.

- (2) Any individual or individuals who have responsibility for campus security but who do not constitute a campus police department or a campus security department, such as an individual who is responsible for monitoring entrance into institutional property.
- (3) Any individual or organization specified in an institution's statement of campus security policy as an individual or organization to which students and employees should report criminal offenses.
- (4) An official of an institution who has significant responsibility for student and campus activities, including but not limited to, student housing, student discipline, and campus judicial proceedings. If such an official is a pastoral or professional counselor although the official is not considered a campus security authority when acting as a pastoral or professional counselor.

FIDM Campus Security Officers have the authority to ask persons for identification and to determine whether individuals have lawful business at FIDM. FIDM Campus Security Officers can make an arrest for crimes committed in their presence. Criminal incidents are referred to the local police who have jurisdiction on the campus. FIDM Campus Security Officers have established and maintain a highly professional, stable, and close working relationship with the local police department for each campus - providing an effective procedure for reporting and investigating alleged criminal offenses. All crime victims and witnesses are strongly encouraged to immediately report the crime to Campus Security Office and the police. Prompt reporting will assure timely warning notices on-campus and timely disclosure of crime statistics.

### **Thefts, Burglaries and other Crimes**

A security officer who becomes aware of a theft, burglary, or other crime on FIDM property must immediately notify a supervisor. If the victim of a crime requires emergency medical assistance, or if there is a continuing risk to others, or a possibility a suspect is still in the area, the security officer should ensure that 911 has been called and that police and/or paramedics are responding. If the situation does not require an emergency response but the victim of the crime or FIDM management requests a police response, security personnel may help to facilitate such response. If a security officer is made aware of a "cold" theft – no suspects seen or heard and no indication the suspects are still on-scene – he/she should notify a supervisor. Generally, in such cases, there is no need for a police response unless the victim requests one. All thefts and other crimes must be documented in an incident report.

### **In the event of an emergency or to report a crime:**

- ◆ **Off-campus:** Report any crime to the local police. For emergencies, please call 911.
- ◆ **On-campus: Report any crime, emergency, and/or suspicious or potentially criminal activity immediately to the Campus Security Authorities.**

*Timely warnings will withhold as confidential the names and other identifying information of victims as defined in section 40002(a)(20) of the Violence Against Women Act of 1994. The institution is not required to issue timely warning of crimes reported to a pastoral or professional counselor as confidential.*

Upon notification and confirmation of a significant emergency or dangerous situation, on or off campus, involving an immediate threat to the health or safety of FIDM students or employees, FIDM shall issue a timely warning notification (FIDM Alert) to the campus community, unless doing so, in the professional judgment of responsible authorities, may compromise efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency. Anyone with information warranting such a timely warning should report the circumstances to the Directors of Security (Los Angeles), Education Directors or Campus Directors (SF, OC, SD) or the Title IX Coordinator.

### **EMERGENCY ALERT NOTIFICATION PROCEDURE**

In the event of an emergency, when FIDM Security or first responders confirm that there is, in fact, an emergency or dangerous situation that poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of some or all members of the college community, first responders will notify authorized staff on the FIDM campus to issue an emergency notification. Directors of Security, Branch Campus Directors and executive administration will determine which portions of the Emergency Alert are activated. FIDM will communicate without delay via cell phone, email or text messaging. As soon as the condition that may compromise efforts is no longer present, an emergency notification will be issued to the FIDM community. It is the student's responsibility to provide current contact information quarterly through the FIDM Portal to be sure he/she receives timely communications. To ensure the optimal level of performance in an emergency, FIDM will regularly conduct a test of the emergency alert notification system. Phone calls and text messages are subject to the conditions and rates of the student's particular calling plan. FIDM will not be held responsible for any charges billed by cell phone providers in efforts to relay information.

### **DISASTER PREPAREDNESS**

Each campus schedules annual fire drills and earthquake drills designed to assess and evaluate emergency response plans. Additionally, each campus has an Emergency Response Team (ERT) which, in all emergencies, is responsible for providing guidance and directions. The ERT manual for each campus is available on the FIDM Portal for staff and faculty to review. Instructors should familiarize themselves with this information. Emergency evacuation procedures are located on the back of the classroom and office doors. It is important that students familiarize themselves with fire evacuation procedures. If the fire alarm rings, students must evacuate the building. Follow arrows marked on the maps to the nearest exit. In an earthquake, falling objects pose the greatest danger. Students should get under a sturdy desk or table if possible. Kneel down and cover their head with their arms. Duck, cover and hold. If evacuation is necessary, students should follow arrows marked on maps to the nearest exit. Additional disaster preparedness information is available from the receptionist at each campus.

### **DAILY CRIME LOG**

The Daily Crime Log records all alleged crimes reported to a Campus Security Authority on each campus. It is organized by the date of the report and includes the date of the crime, in addition to the nature, location, and disposition of each crime. Each campus has the Daily Crime Log available at the Security Desk of the Los Angeles campus and the front desk of the San Francisco, Orange County, and San Diego campuses. The crime log for the most recent 60 - day period is open for public inspection, upon request, during normal business hours. Any portion of the log that is older than 60 days must be made available within two business days of a request for public inspection. Crime logs must be kept for three years following the publication of the last Annual Security Report to which they apply (in effect, seven years).

### **STUDENT CONDUCT**

All students must conform to federal, state, and local laws. They must respect the rights of others and conduct themselves in a manner conducive to the educational mission of the college. Below are important policies which FIDM must enforce in order to maintain a safe and compliant environment for all faculty, staff, and students.



## **ALCOHOL & SUBSTANCE-FREE ENVIRONMENT**

FIDM is committed to providing a workplace and school environment free of alcohol, illegal drugs, non-prescribed medication, or paraphernalia used for these substances. Violation of this policy may result in immediate dismissal from academic programs or college-related employment. All FIDM campuses are smoke-free environments. Smoking includes, but is not limited to, cigarettes, cigars, snuff, smoking tobacco, smokeless tobacco, nicotine, nicotine-delivering devices, chemicals, or devices that produce the same flavor or physical effect of nicotine substances, and any other tobacco innovation.

## **ACADEMIC HONESTY**

All academic work submitted by a student must be original work. Cheating or academic dishonesty includes, but is not limited to, all forms of giving or getting unauthorized help or using unauthorized materials on examinations and projects. This includes work that duplicates, in whole or part, that of another student when the assignment explicitly calls for individual expression. Plagiarism, a form of cheating, involves obtaining or attempting to obtain academic credit by copying the words or ideas of another (from a book, magazine article, or website, for example) and passing them off as one's own without documentation — that is, without acknowledging the source with quotation marks, footnotes, and lists of works cited. Cheating and plagiarism are cause for formal counseling. Students who cheat or plagiarize will receive a “0” on the assignment and may be subject to further disciplinary action.

Violations of the academic honesty policy are reported to the Education Department at all campuses.

## **CAMPUS CONDUCT**

FIDM is committed to a collegiate environment in which respect for others and proper conduct is demonstrated. Hateful language — including profanity, racial, gender, or religious slurs — is unlawful and in direct opposition to an education environment. FIDM promotes a professional environment free from hostility and will not tolerate harassing, bullying, intimidating, or threatening behavior or communication. Any violation will result in disciplinary action including suspension of services, privileges, or dismissal.

## **NON-DISCRIMINATION/SEXUAL HARASSMENT POLICY (Title IX)**

FIDM is committed to providing a safe learning and working environment for students and employees that is free of all forms of discrimination, harassment, exploitation, or intimidation. In keeping with this commitment, FIDM maintains a strict policy prohibiting all forms of unlawful harassment based on race, religion, color, sex, age, national origin, handicap, veteran status, or any other characteristics or conditions protected by state or federal law. This policy applies to all FIDM staff, faculty, students, and agents. Sexual harassment is a form of discrimination that can undermine the foundation of trust and mutual respect that must prevail for the college to fulfill its educational mission. Every member of the campus community should be aware that the college strongly opposes discrimination and that such behavior is prohibited both by law and FIDM's conduct policy. Violations of the non-discrimination policy or sexual harassment policy will not be tolerated and corrective action up to and including disqualification may be taken. For the complete policies or to file a complaint, information is available on the FIDM Portal (under the Sexual Harassment, Non-Discrimination Policy), Student Handbook, or College Catalog.

## **CAMPUS SAFETY AND ACCESS**

FIDM is committed to the safety of its students, faculty, and staff. Students are prohibited from bringing firearms onto any FIDM campus. Illegal weapons or threatening gestures with an object that can be used as a weapon will lead to immediate dismissal. Students are required to visibly wear their valid FIDM Student Photo Identification cards while on FIDM premises. FIDM Student Photo ID cards may not be altered, copied, or forged and are non-transferable. If a student is discovered loaning or altering the FIDM Student Photo ID card, that card will be confiscated and the student will face a mandatory appointment with the Department Chair or Campus Security Director (LA), or Director of Education (SF, OC, SD). Campus access is restricted to posted hours of operation. Please see the CAMPUS SECURITY AND ACCESS POLICY section above or the FIDM Portal for hours of operation. Only registered students are permitted in the classroom. Authorized

guests/visitors are allowed on campus with prior approval and notification to Security from FIDM Staff for college business purposes (i.e., guest presenter, authorized vendor, campus meeting, etc.). All authorized visitors are required to check-in with the Security Desk (LA)/Building Security (SF)/front desk (OC, SD) to obtain a guest/visitor pass. Students and faculty are not permitted to bring family, friends, or business acquaintances on campus.

### DEFACING FIDM PROPERTY

Any student who defaces, vandalizes, or destroys FIDM property (including but not limited to library materials, computers, elevators, restrooms, parking structure, etc.) will be dismissed from the college. All types of spray mount adhesive and spray paint are prohibited from being used on all FIDM campuses.

### SOLICITATION/DISTRIBUTION

The solicitation and distribution to students of non-FIDM materials and the use of the college facility for non-FIDM business purposes is prohibited. Posting flyers, pamphlets, posters, or other means of advertising on the walls or bulletin boards and selling products on campus is not allowed.

### RETALIATION POLICY

Retaliation includes threats, intimidation, reprisal and/or adverse actions related to employment or education, and is strictly prohibited against a person who reports sexual harassment, assists someone with a report of sexual harassment, or participates in any manner in an investigation or resolution of a Title IX complaint. Anyone who perceives retaliation should immediately notify a Title IX Coordinator.

## **HATE CRIMES**

A hate crime is a criminal offense committed against a person, property, or society, which is motivated, in whole or in part, by the offender's prejudice against an actual or perceived race, religion, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, ethnicity, national origin, and disability. Hate crimes involve bodily injury or threat of bodily injury, damage to property, or threat of damage to property. Hate crimes are not tolerated at FIDM and will lead to immediate disqualification/termination, and/or notification of appropriate authorities. FIDM reports the following categories of hate crimes in which local enforcement has determined that the crime manifested evidence that the victim was intentionally selected because of the perpetrator's bias: criminal homicide, sex offenses, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, motor vehicle theft, arson, larceny-theft, simple assault, intimidation, destruction/damage/vandalism of property.

### **In accordance with AB 1433 FIDM will:**

- (1) Require the appropriate officials at each campus within their respective jurisdictions to compile records of both of the following:
  - (A) All occurrences reported to campus police, campus security personnel, or campus safety authorities of, and arrests for, crimes that are committed on campus and that involve violence, hate violence, theft, destruction of property, illegal drugs, or alcohol intoxication.
  - (B) All occurrences of noncriminal acts of hate violence reported to, and for which a written report is prepared by, designated campus authorities.
- (2) Require any written record of a noncriminal act of hate violence to include, but not be limited to, the following:
  - (A) A description of the act of hate violence.
  - (B) Victim characteristics.
  - (C) Offender characteristics, if known.

This document meets the requirements of CA SB 967 and CA AB 2654.

Additionally, CA AB 636 (section 67380) - mandates that any report made by a victim or an employee pursuant to Section 67383 of a Part 1 violent crime, sexual assault, or hate crime, as described in Section 422.55 of the Penal Code, received by a campus security authority and made by the victim for purposes of notifying the institution or law enforcement, to be immediately, or as soon as practicably possible, disclosed to the local law enforcement agency with which the institution has a written agreement pursuant to Section 67381 without identifying the victim, unless the victim consents to being identified after the victim has been informed of his or her right to have his or her personally identifying information withheld. If the victim does not consent to being identified, the alleged assailant shall not be identified in the information disclosed to the local law enforcement agency, unless the institution determines both of the following, in which case the institution shall disclose the identity of the alleged assailant to the local law enforcement agency and shall immediately inform the victim of that disclosure.

The policy includes all of the following:

- (i) The alleged assailant represents a serious or ongoing threat to the safety of students, employees, or the institution.
- (ii) The immediate assistance of the local law enforcement agency is necessary to contact or detain the assailant.

## **CAMPUS SAFETY AWARENESS AND CRIME PREVENTION PROGRAMS**

During each orientation, students are informed about personal safety services. Similar information is presented to new employees. Crime Prevention Programs and Sexual Assault Prevention Programs are periodically offered. During the academic year the Education Department, in cooperation with other college organizations and departments, presents crime prevention awareness sessions on sexual assault (rape and acquaintance rape) and self-defense, as well as educational sessions on personal safety. A common theme of all awareness and crime prevention programs is to encourage students and employees to be aware of their responsibility for their own security and the security of others. In addition, timely warnings are disseminated to students and employees through security alert posters, displays, and articles and advertisements in student newsletters. When time is of the essence, information is released to the college community through security alerts posted prominently throughout campus, through the FIDM Portal or the emergency alert notification system.

## **PERSONAL SAFETY TIPS**

Ultimately each individual is responsible for his/her own safety. Being aware of potentially dangerous situations is the first and most important component of self-protection. A complete brochure titled *Safety Tips for FIDM Students* is provided on the FIDM Portal and hard copies are available from the Personal Counselors on each campus.

## **MONITORING OFF-CAMPUS EVENTS**

Any FIDM activities organized off campus property are under the jurisdiction of local law enforcement and the college does not provide law enforcement personnel.

## **VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN ACT (VAWA) POLICY STATEMENT AND UPDATES**

### **SEXUAL ASSAULT PREVENTION PROGRAMS AND PROCEDURES**

FIDM expects that all members of the college community – students, faculty, staff, etc. – be able to pursue their work and education in a safe environment, free from sexual coercion, violence, and intimidation of any kind. While sexual assault can occur at any time of the day or night to any individual of any age, national studies indicate that students aged 24 or under are particularly vulnerable to being assaulted or raped. The college views this fact with great concern and is committed to meeting its ethical and moral obligation to try to prevent sexual assault; to provide support for assault survivors; and to educate the campus community about sexual assault and rape.

FIDM is committed to providing sexual violence prevention education to its campus community each year. Additionally, FIDM provides programming by request for self-defense and the prevention of not only sexual assault, but also domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, and sexual harassment. Research indicates that approximately 9 out of 10 sexual assaults perpetrated against college women involve two or more individuals who already know one another. College men are also sexually assaulted; therefore, both women and men should know that the college is committed to providing a consistent, timely, and caring response to anyone who is sexually assaulted within the campus community. For the purposes of clarification, the alleged assailant(s) will be referred to as the “named student(s)” and the student filing the report of sexual assault will be referred to as the “reporting student.”

Sexual assault, particularly when perpetrated by an acquaintance, date, or partner, makes it difficult for many survivors to report their experience. For this reason, the Personal Counseling Department has been designated as a place where individuals may confidentially seek assistance. FIDM’s Personal Counselors have been updated on current Title IX VAWA requirements and will continue to strive to foster an environment where survivors of an assault can not only receive confidential counseling but also will have immediate access to applicable resources.

Other campus offices have differing obligations with regard to reporting requirements. While the college recognizes that a reporting student may wish to preserve her or his privacy after a traumatic experience, it should also be understood that the college has a responsibility to maintain the integrity and safety of the campus as a whole and that certain information may therefore be made public. Where circumstances exist that are deemed a danger to the college community at large, pertinent details about a sexual assault will immediately be publicly released. Further, the Student Right-to-Know and Campus Security Act (*the Clery Act*) of 1990 mandates the annual disclosure of statistics of sexual assaults known to have occurred within the college's jurisdiction. Incidents reported to the Personal Counseling Department are included in these statistics along with statistics from Campus Security Authorities. The reporting student's identity is not disclosed in any such statistical reporting.

## **DEFINITIONS**

Important terms used in determining what offenses to report are defined in accordance with the Federal Bureau of Investigation's (FBI) Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) program.

The FBI UCR program is a nationwide, cooperative statistical effort in which city, university and college, county, state, tribal, and federal law enforcement agencies voluntarily report data on crimes brought to their attention. The UCR program also serves as the basis for the definitions of, and the classifying crimes in this subpart.

**SEXUAL ASSAULT** is defined as any sexual act perpetrated upon a person without her or his consent, where the assailant uses physical force, threat, coercion, or intimidation to overpower or control the victim; where the victim fears that she or he or another person will be injured or otherwise harmed if she or he does not submit; where the victim is prevented from resisting due to the influence of alcohol or other drugs; or where consent is otherwise not freely given. A sexual act includes, but is not limited to, actual or attempted intercourse, sexual touching, fondling, or groping. Sexual assault is classified as rape when vaginal, anal, or oral intercourse takes place without the consent of the person penetrated. This includes penetration by a foreign object.

**AFFIRMATIVE CONSENT** means affirmative, conscious, and voluntary agreement to engage in sexual activity. It is the responsibility of each person involved in the sexual activity to ensure that he or she has the affirmative consent of the other or others to engage in the sexual activity. Lack of protest or resistance does not mean consent, nor does silence mean consent. Affirmative consent must be ongoing throughout a sexual activity and can be revoked at any time. The existence of a dating relationship between the persons involved, or the fact of past sexual relations between them, should never by itself be assumed to be an indicator of consent.<sup>1</sup>

**CONSENT** is defined as positive cooperation. When people consent to sexual activity, they will have verbally indicated that they are participating willingly, freely, and voluntarily. The existence of a dating relationship between the persons involved, or the fact of past sexual relations between them, should never by itself be assumed to be an indicator of consent, nor does silence equal consent.

**DOMESTIC VIOLENCE** includes asserted violent misdemeanor and felony offenses committed by the victim's current or former spouse, current or former cohabitant, person similarly situated under domestic or family violence law, or anyone else protected under domestic or family violence law.

**DATING VIOLENCE** means violence committed by a person who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim. Such existence of such a relationship is based on the consideration of length, type, and frequency of interactions between the persons involved in the relationship.

**STALKING** means a course of conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to fear for her, his, or others' safety, or to suffer substantial emotional distress.

Within this definition of stalking, these terms are defined: “*Course of Conduct*” is two or more acts, including, but not limited to, acts in which the stalker directly, indirectly, or through third parties, by any action, method, device, or means, follows, monitors, observes, surveils, threatens, or communicates to or about a person, or interferes with a person’s property. “*Substantial Emotional Distress*” is interpreted as significant mental suffering or anguish that may, but does not necessarily, require medical or other professional treatment or counseling. “*Reasonable Person*” would mean a reasonable person under similar circumstances and with similar identities to the victim.

**INCEST** is non-forcible sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law.

**FONDLING** means the touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, without the consent of the victim, including instances where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her age or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental incapacity.

**STATUTORY RAPE** is non-forcible sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent.

## **RESPONSE TO REPORTS OF SEXUAL ASSAULT**

FIDM is committed to creating a campus environment that both promotes and expedites prompt reporting and timely and fair adjudication of sexual assault cases and has adopted policies and procedures that comply with SB 967. All college personnel are required to notify Campus Security Authorities upon receiving a report of sexual assault. Students who are sexually assaulted are provided support services and are entitled to certain rights that shall be accorded by all college officers, administrators, and employees. ## **SUPPORT SERVICES AND RIGHTS**

The college’s immediate response to reports of sexual assault is to ensure that all parties are treated with respect, care, and support.

- The reporting student is informed of the importance of preserving evidence required for proof of possible criminal activity, or in obtaining a protection order.
- All reporters of sexual assault, dating violence, domestic violence, and stalking are made aware of their *option* to notify local law enforcement authorities, and the ability of Campus Security Authorities to assist in notification, if requested. Information, assistance, and requirements on filing orders of protection, no-contact orders, restraining orders, or similar lawful orders issued by a court will be made available by the college.
- This includes the right to be free from pressure not to report crimes to civil or criminal authorities, or to report them as lesser offenses than the victims perceives them to be.
- The reporting student shall be informed of existing on- and off-campus services including, but not limited to, personal counseling, medical and mental health professionals, victim advocacy, legal assistance, and visa and immigration assistance. Aid in accessing such services is provided, if requested.
- The right to have interim protective measures, including, but not limited to academic, residential, transportation, and/or employment accommodations reasonably available, to ensure the well-being of all parties. Any such interim measures shall be implemented in a manner intended to achieve their purpose while at the same time limiting, to the extent practicable, and without adverse effect to either party’s educational program.

- The right to have a formal investigation conducted by proper civil and criminal authorities, and to have the full and prompt assistance and cooperation of campus personnel in this regard (in addition to any campus disciplinary proceedings that may take place).

These rights, services, and options are available regardless of whether the reporting student chooses to report the crime to Campus Security Authorities or local law enforcement, if requested. The college will take immediate action to investigate all reports of sexual assault, take appropriate steps to prevent its recurrence, offer remedies that address its effects, and cooperate with any criminal investigation, separate from the college investigation.

## **WHAT TO DO IF YOU EXPERIENCE SEXUAL ASSAULT, DATING VIOLENCE, DOMESTIC VIOLENCE, OR STALKING**

The college prohibits the crimes of sexual assault and dating violence. These crimes include rape, fondling, incest, or statutory rape (as defined in the FBI's UCR program and included in Appendix A'' to subpart D of part 668). Dating violence is committed by a person who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim. All members of the FIDM community are encouraged to contact Campus Security Authorities if they observe or encounter conduct that may be a sexual assault, dating violence, domestic violence, and stalking. Reports of sexual assault, dating violence, domestic violence, and stalking should be brought forward as soon as possible after the alleged conduct occurs. While there is no specific timeframe for reporting, prompt reporting will better enable FIDM to respond to the report, determine the issues, and provide an appropriate remedy. All incidents should be reported even if a significant amount of time has passed.

It is strongly advised that any student who is sexually assaulted have a medical examination, even if they think that no physical injury has occurred or they do not wish to file formal charges of any kind.

If you are a victim of sexual assault:

- Go to a safe location.
- If you want to report the crime, notify the local Police Department and/or Campus Security, if an emergency, call 911.
- If the assailant is a student at FIDM, you can file a formal report with the Coordinator of Student Affairs (LA) and Education Directors (SF, OC, SD) in addition to filing a Police Department report.
- Preserve all physical evidence of the assault, even if you are unsure whether you want to report the crime. Do not shower, bathe, douche, eat, drink, wash your hands, or brush your teeth until after you have had a medical examination. Save all clothing that you were wearing at the time of the assault and bring them and any other potential evidence to the medical exam. Place each item of clothing in a separate paper bag (do not use plastic bags). Do not clean or disturb the area where the assault occurred. Such evidence may assist in proving that the alleged criminal offense occurred or may be helpful in obtaining a protection order.
- Call a trusted friend, family member, or someone else who can provide support.
- Get medical care as soon as possible. Go to a hospital, emergency department, or a specialized forensic clinic that works with sexual assault survivors. Here are a couple of options in Los Angeles; the Rape Treatment Center (310.319.4000/24 hrs.) or the Violence Intervention Program (323.226.3961/24 hrs.). Both locations provide medical care and the collection of forensic evidence. You may also request medications for the prevention of sexually transmitted infections (including HIV) and emergency contraception.
- If you think you may have been given a rape drug, request that the hospital or clinic take urine and blood samples. These samples need to be collected quickly as these kinds of drugs leave the system quickly.
- Talk to a counselor for emotional support and advocacy. You can speak confidentially with a counselor on-campus at the Personal Counseling Department. See the Personal Counselor contact information below. If you would prefer to seek counseling off-campus, see listings below for off-campus services.

### CONFIDENTIALITY

To protect students’ safety and rights to privacy, FIDM will preserve confidentiality to the maximum extent possible to avoid re-victimization and retribution, without impairing FIDM’s ability to provide accommodations or protective measures. The college strives to provide safe and positive options for bystander intervention that may be carried out by an individual to prevent harm or intervene when there is a risk of dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking against a person other than the individual.

Completed publicly available recordkeeping, including that for the purposes of Clery Act reporting and disclosure, is done without the inclusion of “identifying information” about the student. Identifying information includes information likely to disclose the location of a victim of dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking, regardless of whether the information is encoded, encrypted, hashed, or otherwise protected (e.g. first and last name, home or other physical address, contact information, Social Security number, driver license number, passport, and student identification number). This is also inclusive of other personal information such as date of birth, racial or



ethnic background, or religious affiliation. Students who have been sexually assaulted or are survivors of other gender-based abuse or harm are encouraged to seek and utilize confidential assistance from Personal Counseling Services.

### **CAMPUS DISCIPLINARY RESPONSE FOR SEXUAL ASSAULT**

Sexual assault is prohibited both by law and FIDM's conduct policy. Offenders are subject to disciplinary sanction. Violations of this policy will not be tolerated and corrective action including disqualification may be taken. Where a report is made alleging that a sexual assault has been perpetrated by a student against another student, the college is committed to providing a fair and appropriate adjudication, in addition to assisting the law enforcement authorities with any criminal investigation that might occur.

Procedures for prompt and impartial investigation and resolution in cases of alleged dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking, provide for a hearing process that protects the safety of victims and promotes accountability. The reporting student and the named student are entitled to the same level of support at any disciplinary proceedings. Each party is accommodated with a designated official to assist in disseminating information including, but not limited to, policies, procedures, and rights to promote a thorough and fair investigation and disciplinary proceeding. Both parties are entitled to the same opportunities to have representatives present during a campus disciplinary proceeding, including the opportunity to be accompanied to any related meeting or proceeding by an advisor of their choice. No less than two trained, impartial officials will adjudicate the disciplinary. The standard of adjudication will be preponderance of evidence.

In compliance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) and Title IX regulations, all parties shall be simultaneously informed, in writing, of the outcome of any campus disciplinary proceeding brought alleging a sexual assault, dating violence, domestic violence, or stalking. All parties will be informed of the college's procedures for appealing the results of disciplinary proceeding. All parties will be informed of any changes to the results that occur prior to the time that the results become final, and when such results become final. Upon request, the institution will disclose the results of any disciplinary proceeding conducted by the institution against a student who is the alleged perpetrator of any crime of violence or a non-forcible sex offense to the alleged victim or next of kin, if the victim is deceased.

Students should understand that the use of alcohol or other drugs in no way diminishes their personal responsibility for acts of sexual assault perpetrated while under the influence of such substances.

### **NOTICE REGARDING REGISTERED SEX OFFENDER INFORMATION**

The Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act provides for the tracking of convicted sex offenders enrolled at or employed at institutions of higher education. As of October 28, 2002, the State of California (Penal Code section 290) requires sex offenders to register within the state and also register within 5 working days with a Campus Security Authority at the location where the person is employed, carries on a vocation, or is a student. In addition, such institutions of higher education are required to provide information to their campus community regarding where to obtain law enforcement information concerning such registered sex offenders (Megan's Law sex offenders). A Registered Sex Offender Locator map is available at the following link: [www.meganslaw.ca.gov](http://www.meganslaw.ca.gov). In addition, the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department website (<http://www.lasd.org>) has a link entitled "Sexual Offenders (Megan's Law)" that contains more information that can assist you in obtaining information regarding sex offenders. Please note, however, that it is illegal under California law to use any disclosed public information to commit a crime against any registrant or to engage in illegal discrimination or harassment against any registrant.
